National Registration Nomination Update

Pima County's consultant, Statistical Research, Inc. (SRI), has been working steadily on the nomination. They will be delivering the nomination package to the County no later than 14 November for a final review before it is sent to the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO). SRI had requested an extension due to the number of comments received from the first round. Once the final version has been submitted and accepted by SHPO, it will be passed to the Keeper of the National Register in Washington DC. We anticipate acceptance, but the final word will be given to us via the Arizona SHPO. The entire process should be competed soon!!

From the Bunkhouse: The Bridge at Agua Caliente

In 1951, when we moved to "The Agua Caliente Ranch", there was a very nice wooden bridge from the shore in front of the small island in the lake. That bridge is still there, however it is in such disrepair that it needs to be replaced. I have very fond memories of the bridge. We had two boats, one a canoe and the other a flat bottom row boat. We used these boats to travel around to the three lakes near to the Ranch house. There were small canals between the lakes that made this possible. We had a lot of fun rowing around the lakes. The boats were also used for the two hired hands to pull out the cat tails and reeds as they broke the surface of the water. We kept the three lakes around the house free from reeds & cattails. We also swam in the part of the lake which now is overrun with cattails, as at that time it was separated from the bridge where the island is by a piece of land that was about 10 feet wide.

Having a bridge to the island goes back to 1901. I have a photograph donated to us that shows a bridge to the island dated 1901, however it was not this bridge. As far as I can tell, the current bridge was built sometime during the mid 1930's and was in use until the 1990's.
